WORKSHOP ON 21st CENTURY CURES AND SENATE INNOVATION ACT: WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?

The 21st Century Cures Act is a far-reaching piece of legislation that moves medical research forward in the United States, streamlines certain approval processes, and dedicates funding to the FDA and the NIH. It also shows a bipartisan commitment to health research and to compromise, having passed the House 344-77. Now, however, the Senate's version is stalled and it isn't clear when/if it will move forward. This panel will discuss the advocacy work that was done by organizations and individuals all across the country to pass the House bill, what can be done to move the process forward in the Senate — and what we do if we run out of time before it passes during this Congress.
