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
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
Thesis: The more we spend on healthcare, the worse our health outcomes

Rationale: Increased spending on healthcare reduces spending on items that are more important for health than healthcare: education, wages, jobs, housing, infrastructure, environment, etc.

Dollars (US\$), adjusted for differences in cost of living



OECD average: 80.7






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The U.S. Has the Highest Rate of Avoidable Deaths
